#### Cross-Party Group in the Scottish Parliament on Visual Impairment #CPGVI

## Purpose of the group:

The Cross-Party Group on Visual Impairment draws together the blind and partially sighted sector in Scotland to identify issues competent to the Scottish Parliament and seeks, in a reasonable fashion, to influence policy, legislation and decision makers to better reflect the needs of blind and partially sighted people.

# **Meetings and Activities**

The Cross-Party Group on Visual Impairment (CPGVI) held meetings on:

- Tuesday 5 December 2023
- Wednesday 21 February 2024
- Wednesday 4 September 2024 (AGM)

The meeting on 4 September 2024 was held via Teams; the meetings on 5 December 2023 and 21 February 2024 were hybrid meetings, taking place in the Scottish Parliament and via Teams. All the meetings were quorate.

A meeting planned for 5 June 2024 was postponed due to the general election on 4 July.

## Tuesday 5 December 2023, 18.00-19.30 Held in Committee Room 3, Scottish Parliament, and online

MSPs present: Four (one non-CPG member MSP attending as guest) Non-MSP members present: 32 (six in person; 26 online) Speakers: Four (two in person; two online) Observers: Three (all online)

While several topics were raised under Any Other Competent Business (AOCB), there were two key agenda items:

- 1. Human rights in Scotland
- 2. Visual impairment rehabilitation

## 1. Human rights in Scotland

Mhairi Snowden, Director of the Human Rights Consortium Scotland, gave a presentation, "It's all Rights – A Human Rights Bill for Scotland".

She provided background to the potential Human Rights Bill for Scotland, a key piece of legislation which seeks to pull together a range of issues on human rights within the devolved context in Scotland. The plan is to bring several United Nations Conventions (called international treaties) into Scots law. The right to a healthy environment is also explicitly laid out in the bill – this includes things like the right to clean air, safe water, etc.

She acknowledged that a Scottish Human Rights Bill would be an ambitious and complex piece of legislation due to the nature of devolution and certain constraints. However, it is hoped it will close the gap between the rhetoric of human rights, what's included in law and people's reality.

Her presentation was followed by Gillian Hallard of RNIB Scotland, stepping in for Sophie Bridger of Chest Heart & Stroke Scotland, to highlight "The Right to Rehabilitation" campaign. The campaign brings together organisations to demand that rehabilitation is part of the Human Rights Bill in Scotland. It was stressed that rehabilitation is a crucial part of re-adapting to life independently. People may require rehabilitation at various times of their life and for several reasons. They may have a need for visual rehabilitation after acquiring a sight loss condition but can require support again in the future if their needs change.

## 2. Visual impairment rehabilitation

Specific aspects of visual impairment rehabilitation were emphasised by a panel discussion:

- Gillian Hallard, RNIB Scotland – Overview on VI rehabilitation in Scotland.

- Laura Walker, Visibility Scotland, Chair of Scottish Visual Services Steering Group (SVSSG) – Actions taken to address rehab issues for blind and partially sighted people

- Adam Lodge, Visibility Scotland – Explaining the "Right to Dream" project (Visibility Scotland in partnership with Deaf Blind Scotland)

In 2021 the Scottish Sensory Hub made a review of the visual rehabilitation workforce in Scotland. This found the visual rehabilitation workforce in Scotland was reducing and many Rehab Workers are approaching retirement age. The Scottish Visual Services Steering Group (SVSSG) is a consortium made up of Scottish sight loss and its key aims include reinstating the Graduate Low Vision Rehabilitation Course in Scotland. This is near completion with Glasgow Caledonian University running the course for nineteen students.

The benefits of visual rehabilitation can't be understated – it provides people with the skills and resources to maintain independence and manage daily life with a sight loss condition

# Any Other Competent Business (AOCB)

Under AOCB, the meeting also received information on the following:

- A collaboration request from Colin Beattie MSP Convener of the CPG on Deafness. It was agreed to contact the CPGD for further information and to invite a representative to the next CPGVI meeting.
- 2. A short update from Mike Moore, Guide Dogs Scotland, on the pavement parking ban now in place in Scotland.
- 3. A short update from Sylvia Paton, Chair of the campaign group Keep Edinburgh Eye Pavilion (KEEP), on the ongoing campaign to build a replacement eye hospital in Edinburgh for the Princess Alexandra Eye Hospital, Edinburgh –
- 4. Information on the Scottish Vision Strategy Conference, March 2024.
- 5. The Convener Stuart McMillan MSP reported on his meeting with reps from Glaukos and RLT UK (Red Light Therapy).

## Wednesday 21 February 2024, 13.00-14.15 Held in Committee Room 3, Scottish Parliament, and online

MSPs present: Two (both in person) Non-MSP members present: 34 (ten in person; 24 online) Speakers: Four (three in person; one online) Observers: Ten (six in person; four online)

Three key items were on the agenda:

- 1. Scotland Electoral Reform
- 2. UK General Election 2024/2025 and Voter ID
- 3. Access to glaucoma medical technologies in Scotland

# 1. Scotland - Electoral Reform

George Adam MSP, Minister for Parliamentary Business, gave an update on the Scottish Elections (Representation and Reform) Bill and on solutions under development by the Scottish Government Elections Team to enable people with visual impairments to cast their vote during elections independently and in secret.

Chris Highcock, Secretary of the Electoral Management Board (EMB) for Scotland, highlighted the work of the Board. The EMB has a responsibility to coordinate the activities of Returning Officers across Scotland. This includes promoting best practice and working towards achieving consistency across Scotland when it comes to the delivery of elections.

He said that in the short-term, changes will be made ahead of the upcoming UK General Election. Recommendations for Returning Officers and Election Registration Officers include better signage at polling stations, training of staff, and having accessible information online. In the medium term, it is hoped more accessible measures will be in place for the Scottish Parliamentary Elections in 2026.

The session generated lively discussion and it was agreed to circulate EMB contacts and for CPGVI members to send comments and information via the CPG Secretary.

## 2. UK General Election 2024/2025 and Voter ID

Catherine Heggie of the Electoral Commission spoke on preparations for the next UK general election. Although a date for the Election has not been announced, it must take place by the end of January 2025.

Voter ID will be required for voting at polling stations at the UK General Election in Scotland; however, Voter ID is not required for voting at Scottish Parliament or Scottish local government elections.

The Electoral Commission agreed to send contact details and information on Voter ID requirements for circulation to CPGVI members.

**3.** Access to glaucoma medical technologies in Scotland Tim Robinson, Market Development Manager with Glaukos, gave information about a medical aid which can help to prevent deterioration in sight amongst patients with early-stage glaucoma.

It is a small titanium stent which can help to drain excess fluid which often builds up in the eye and can raise pressure and cause problems in people with glaucoma. Scotland has a growing number of people diagnosed with glaucoma, with estimates suggesting around 78,000 people now live with the condition. However, it has been suggested up to 50 per cent of glaucoma cases go undetected so the figure could be far higher.

To date an estimated 50,000 people across the UK have now had surgery to insert the stent. However, only five hundred people in Scotland have had the treatment. Parts of the country such as Glasgow and Dundee are offering the treatment more than other areas.

A Parliamentary Roundtable is taking place on 21<sup>st</sup> March 2024, sponsored by Stuart McMillan MSP, for those interested in learning more about this treatment.

## Any other competent business

It was agreed that the Secretary should circulate the Terms of Reference for the CPG on Deafness Sensory Care and Dementia Working Group to CPG members and ask for any expressions of interest in joining the working group.

# Wednesday 4 September 2024, 18.00-19.30 Held online

There were three key items were on the agenda:

# 1. AGM and Election of Office Bearers

The existing office bearers were re-elected.

- Convener Stuart McMillan MSP
- Vice-Convener Neil Bibby MSP
- Secretariat RNIB Scotland; Dr Catriona Burness

## 2. The work of the Cross-Party Group (CPG) on Deafness Working Group on Sensory Care and Dementia

Roz McCall MSP, Chair of the Cross-Party Group (CPG) on Deafness Working Group on Sensory Care and Dementia, gave an update on the working group, noting that two CPGVI members had joined the working group.

She referred to the growing numbers of individuals living in Scotland who are affected by dual sensory loss and noted links which exist between sensory loss and dementia. For example, hearing loss has been closely related to an increasing risk of dementia, particularly amongst an ageing population.

The CPG on Deafness has set up a working group to look at developing sensory and dementia care standards for those receiving support within care homes and from care services at home. In July 2024, three short surveys were conducted to explore how sensory needs are integrated into dementia assessments. The surveys also gathered information on post-diagnosis support available for those with sensory loss and dementia. Early analysis of the findings has identified a good awareness of the need to include sensory loss in dementia assessments but low awareness of tools available to do this. A fuller report will be available later in the year.

**3. Developments in community optometry in Scotland** Eilidh Thomson, Vice Chair of Optometry Scotland highlighted developments in community optometry in Scotland.

These include changes to the Community Optometry Undergraduate scheme. The four-year honours degree course will be replaced with a five-year Masters degree which will help streamline the qualification process. Previous arrangements saw students graduate after four years followed by a one-year work placement. The change to a fiveyear programme will include place-based training in the final year. She highlighted Scotland's ambitions to incorporate independent prescribing into the Masters degree. This will help expand the role and responsibilities of what optometrists can do, vastly improving the care and treatment which optometrists can provide.

The emphasis was on increasing the role of community optometrists within eye health.

Reference was also made to the Scottish Government's short life working group looking at gaps in care, specifically within domiciliary optometry services, which delivers support at home. Maintaining this level of service, particularly in rural and remote areas, present challenges due to available funding, but it is hoped to ensure domiciliary optometry services remain available to those who require it.

Several organisations – the Scottish Sensory Hub, RNIB Scotland and Sight Scotland - offered their support to establishing a low vision service in the community.

# Any other competent business

Under AOCB three topics were raised:

- 1. James Adams shared the sad news that Sandra Wilson, former Chair of RNIB Scotland, member of the CPGVI and a great supporter of the sight loss community in Scotland, recently passed away. She was a formidable character and an outstanding advocate for all blind and partially sighted people in Scotland and will be sorely missed by many. It was agreed that the CPGVI express condolences to her family and friends.
- 2. RNIB Scotland is holding a reception in the Scottish Parliament in January 2025, hosted by Stuart McMillan MSP, to mark the 200th anniversary of the invention of braille. Invitations will be circulated in due course with places allocated on a first come, first served basis.
- 3. The Convener Stuart McMillan MSP reported that he had asked the Cabinet Secretary for Finance to confirm whether free eye health examinations will remain in Scotland. The Finance Secretary confirmed that free eye examinations will be safeguarded in Scotland.
