Members' Business motions that have not achieved cross party support

***[S6M-13640](#) Beatrice Wishart: Rural and Island Digital Connectivity Challenges**—That the Parliament notes with concern that many households in rural and island Scotland face challenges regarding digital connectivity; understands that Ofcom reports that 25% of Shetland households have broadband speeds of less than 30Mbps; further understands that, despite the initial Scottish Government ambition to connect every household to superfast broadband by 2021 through the R100 programme, it is now estimated that full R100 rollout will not be achieved until 2028; notes the reported intention of telecommunications companies to retire the copper phone line network and replace phone lines with digital connections using fibre broadband; understands that this replacement is due by 2027; notes with concern reports that many households are unable to switch to digital phone lines due to lack of broadband connectivity in their area, which, it understands, can cause particular problems for customers with healthcare devices that use the phone line, or those who live in areas with poor mobile phone signal; expresses its disappointment that rural and island households are facing such difficulties, particularly in light of increasingly frequent adverse weather events, which, it understands, put rural and island households at risk of power outages; considers that poor 4G signal in rural and island areas has negative implications for businesses and education; understands that many households in Scotland are unable to be connected to smart meters due to poor connectivity of the smart meter network in their areas, with latest figures showing that less than 10% of households in Scotland's island groups have smart meters; further understands that many of these households still use legacy radio teleswitch meters, with Scotland having a higher proportion of these meters than other parts of the UK; notes with concern that the radio teleswitch signal is due to be switched off by 30 June 2025, which, it believes, could leave households stuck paying higher tariffs; further notes the belief that a digital divide is detrimental, and notes the calls for both of Scotland's governments to work together to address the digital connectivity challenges facing households in rural and island Scotland.

***[S6M-13638](#) Clare Adamson: Katrina Phillips, Services to Child Safety**—That the Parliament congratulates Katrina Phillips, chief executive of the Child Accident Prevention Trust, on receiving

an OBE for services to child safety in the New Year Honours List 2023; notes that the Child Accident Prevention Trust, which was established by two paediatricians, is the only UK charity to focus on preventing death and serious injury to children from avoidable accidents; commends what it sees as Katrina's unwavering commitment to the safety of children; recognises that, since her appointment as chief executive in September 2001, Katrina has dedicated herself to ensuring that no child loses their life or endures the suffering of a preventable serious accident; acknowledges Katrina's work to frame safety as a social justice issue, given that accidents disproportionately impact children in more deprived areas, and commends what it sees as Katrina's passion and tireless advocacy for child safety throughout her career and through her continued support as a valued member of the Cross-Party Group on Accident Prevention and Safety Awareness.

***S6M-13637 Finlay Carson: Laura Kiltie Named National Youth Worker of the Year**—That the Parliament congratulates Laura Kiltie, a youth development worker in Wigtownshire, on winning the prestigious National Youth Worker of the Year Award at an awards ceremony held on 12 June 2024; considers that Laura is one of the most inspirational and committed youth workers in the region, evidenced every day by her dedication to the young people in the area as well as schools and associated partners; recognises that she has also led the development of a number of regional projects, including the Young Women's Network, volunteer programmes and the Year of Young People scheme; believes that her recognition is testament to the wider work being carried out by the Youth Work Team in Wigtownshire, and wishes Laura continued success in her starring role and developing year.

***S6M-13636 Craig Hoy: Celebrating the 200th Anniversary of the Great British Pint**—That the Parliament celebrates the 200th anniversary of the great British pint; believes that the pint symbolises Scotland's history as a brewing powerhouse; recognises what it sees as the strategic importance of Scotland's beer and pub sector to the Scottish economy, with, it understands, over 100 breweries and 4,340 pubs employing in the region of 65,000 people and contributing £1.8 billion of wider economic benefit; understands that the sector is facing significant challenges, from changing consumer habits and rising costs to what it sees as a growing regulatory burden, and wishes the sector well going into the EURO 2024 tournament, with the Scottish Beer and Pub Association predicting that an extra 1.8 million pints will be poured in Scotland's pubs, providing what it considers will be a significant boost to the sector and the wider economy. **R**

***S6M-13634 Sue Webber: Professor Lis Neubeck Named Winner of the Outstanding Achievement Award at the RCN Scotland Nurse of the Year Awards 2024**—That the Parliament congratulates Professor Lis Neubeck, head of the Centre for Cardiovascular Health at Edinburgh Napier University, on receiving the Outstanding Achievement Award at the Royal College of Nursing (RCN) Scotland Nurse of the Year Awards 2024; recognises what it sees as the tireless dedication and passion that Professor Neubeck has shown for nursing innovation and research, which, it understands, has revolutionised health care delivery, particularly in the realm of spontaneous coronary artery dissection (SCAD) in Scotland; understands that, through her innovative strategies and commitment to person-centred care, she has significantly improved patient experiences and outcomes; further understands that Professor Neubeck's work began with identifying challenges in accessing specialist care for SCAD patients, leading to her research and eventual establishment of a SCAD clinic in Scotland, where her collaboration with colleagues and

outreach to specialists in different fields, like menopause specialists, showcased her holistic approach to health care; believes that her rigorous research methods have not only advanced the understanding of SCAD but have also informed policy development, shaping the future of health care in Scotland, and wishes Professor Neubeck continued success in her career.

***[S6M-13633](#) Sue Webber: West Lothian Nurse, Frances Aitken, Named Winner of the Mental Health Nursing Award at the RCN Scotland Nurse of the Year Awards 2024** —That the Parliament congratulates Frances Aitken, lead dementia nurse for Stress and Distress at St John's Hospital, Livingston, on being named winner of the Mental Health Nursing Award Category at the Royal College of Nursing (RCN) Scotland Nurse of the Year Awards 2024; understands that Frances works to improve the care experience for patients with cognitive decline in St John's Hospital's acute setting by reducing stress and distress, emergency psychiatric interventions and over-medication with sedatives; further understands that Frances has led the implementation of the Stress and Distress programme, running awareness training for staff for their understanding of cognitive conditions, helping to reduce the need for one-to-one nursing, sedation and emergency calls, along with improved pain management for patients; believes that her work has improved staff knowledge, increased partnership with families and enhanced patient experience, and wishes her continued success in her career.

***[S6M-13632](#) Sue Webber: Professor Juliet MacArthur, Named Joint Winner of the Inspiring Excellence – Nursing Research and Innovation Award at the RCN Scotland Nurse of the Year Awards 2024** —That the Parliament congratulates Professor Juliet MacArthur, chief nurse for research and development in NHS Lothian, on being named joint winner of the Royal College of Nursing (RCN) Scotland Inspiring Excellence – Nursing Research and Innovation Award category at the RCN Scotland Nurse of the Year Awards 2024; understands that this award aims to recognise those who have influenced change with a measurable impact on outcomes and/or experience, and that Professor MacArthur has been instrumental in advancing clinical academic careers and research partnerships in various health care disciplines across Edinburgh and the Lothians, demonstrating leadership in project development, particularly focusing on nursing and midwifery candidates in the Lothian Clinical Academic Research Gateway Awards scheme; further understands that the impact of Professor MacArthur's work extends beyond local level, as demonstrated by the adoption of a similar format by the Chief Scientist Office for the nationwide NHS Researcher Development Fellowships scheme; recognises how much Juliet's colleagues admire her vision and dedication to supporting clinical academic research partnerships, and wishes Professor MacArthur continued success in her career.

***[S6M-13623](#) Stuart McMillan: IRH Children's Centre Transformed Thanks to Charity Funding**—That the Parliament welcomes a £36,000 donation from Glasgow Children's Hospital Charity to upgrade the multi-disciplinary child development centre at Inverclyde Royal Hospital (IRH); notes that the Skylark Centre, which is used by young people aged up to 18 for a variety of reasons, has been given a colourful new look to make it a friendly and welcoming environment for patients and their families; understands that the upgrade was carried out in the centre's waiting area and neurodevelopment assessment area, and includes a bright mural installed on the wall of the waiting area and two images donated by local photographers, Jamie Donnelly and Neil Barr of The French Memorial in Greenock and The Cloch Lighthouse in Gourock; appreciates that there is also a TV for older children and teenagers, and brand new furniture to make the area feel more relaxing and less clinical; recognises that around 800 children per year will benefit from the transformation, with services delivered at the Skylark Centre also including paediatrics, physiotherapy, acute clinics, community clinics, rheumatology, diabetes and dieticians; acknowledges that an additional £9,500 has been provided by Glasgow Children's Hospital

***[S6M-13622](#) Michelle Thomson: Local Initiatives Celebrate 10,000 Hours of Volunteering—** That the Parliament congratulates volunteers at Kersiebank Community Centre, in Grangemouth, on accumulating over 10,000 hours of volunteering time; notes that the Kersiebank Community Centre hosts the Grangemouth Community Pantry, GEM in Grangemouth Association and the Grangemouth Community Café and Garden; understands that all groups are run solely by volunteers with support from Falkirk Council's Community Development Team; recognises that the Grangemouth Community Pantry, which provides a low-cost alternative to food banks and aims to top up main food shopping, has also piloted lunch clubs and cafes with further training for volunteers thanks to the Food Futures Fund; further recognises that the GEM (Growing, Eating and Meeting) in Grangemouth Association aims to grow its own produce and grow the skills of volunteers, offer low-cost or free food in a dignified way, and brings the community together to combat loneliness through volunteering initiatives or activities put in place by the association to benefit the local community; considers that community initiatives such as these are important in the cost-of-living crisis, providing food activity and services, socialising opportunities and improving mental health and wellbeing; congratulates all volunteers involved in the projects on reaching 10,000 hours of volunteering hours, and wishes them well for all their future endeavours for the local community.

Waste reprocessing infrastructure report

- (1) The Scottish Ministers must prepare and publish a waste reprocessing infrastructure report.
- (2) A waste reprocessing infrastructure report is to set out the Scottish Ministers policies and proposals for the use and development of waste reprocessing infrastructure.
- (3) A waste reprocessing infrastructure report must—
 - (a) map out—
 - (i) current waste infrastructure,
 - (ii) planned waste infrastructure,
 - (iii) any proposed infrastructure by the Scottish Ministers or other relevant bodies,
 - (b) contain a strategy to—
 - (i) develop waste management data, for each waste management option used in Scotland,
 - (ii) reduce the proportion of recyclable materials in the residual waste stream,
 - (iii) strengthen local and community engagement and trust,
 - (iv) strengthen existing requirements for pre-treatment, in particular to remove as much recyclable material as feasible, with a particular focus on plastics,
 - (v) work in partnership with industry to deploy combined heat and power for as many existing incineration facilities,
 - (c) contain targets for resource and waste management,
 - (d) report on greenhouse gas emissions for each waste management option.
- (4) In preparing the waste reprocessing infrastructure report, the Scottish Ministers must have regard to any National Planning Framework published by them under the Town and Country Planning (Scotland) Act 1997.
- (5) The Scottish Ministers must lay a waste reprocessing infrastructure report before the Scottish Parliament.
- (6) The Scottish Ministers must prepare and publish the waste reprocessing infrastructure report before the expiry of one year beginning with the day after Royal Assent.>
