\*<u>S6M-15476</u> Stuart McMillan: Celebrating the 150th Anniversary of the Greenock Model Yacht and Power Boat Club—That the Parliament congratulates the Greenock Model Yacht and Power Boat Club on its 150th anniversary; understands that the club, based at Murdieston Dam, was established in 1874 and is the second-oldest model yacht and power boat club of its kind in the UK; recognises the club's resilience and longevity, having survived two world wars and continued to appeal to enthusiasts across three centuries; commends the dedication of its strong members, including Alan Westlake, club commodore and secretary, for maintaining the club's strong membership and supporting activities that include wind-powered and radio-controlled model boating; applauds the club's efforts to attract younger members, with current members ranging in age from 19 to 72, as well as its community outreach projects like building boats with local schoolchildren; notes the club's recent grant to repair the clubhouse roof, and wishes the Greenock Model Yacht and Power Boat Club continued success in preserving this historic pastime for future generations.

\*<u>S6M-15474</u> Neil Bibby: Congratulating Volunteers and Staff of the Tannahill Centre—That the Parliament congratulates the volunteers and staff at the Tannahill Centre in Ferguslie Park, Paisley, on receiving The King's Award for Voluntary Service 2024; understands that the centre received the award for its work in empowering local people to create and provide services for positive living; recognises that The King's Award for Voluntary Service is the highest award given to voluntary organisations in the UK, and is equivalent in rank to the Member of the Order of the British Empire award; notes that the Tannahill Centre is one of just 21 organisations in Scotland to receive the award in 2024, and wishes the volunteers and staff all the best in their continued efforts to support people in their community.

\*<u>S6M-15471</u> Rhoda Grant: Lamb for St Andrew's Day—That the Parliament celebrates the Lamb for St Andrew's Day initiative, which aims to make delicious, nutritious and sustainable Scotch Lamb synonymous with St Andrew's Day; notes that organisations from across the Scottish red meat supply chain, including the Institute for Auctioneers and Appraisers in Scotland (IAAS) and Quality Meat Scotland (QMS), come together to implement and promote the campaign; understands that part of the initiative is the Lamb Bank operated by IAAS, which enables

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participating schools to serve Scotch Lamb to their pupils for St Andrew's Day; celebrates reports that the Lamb Bank has enabled over 100,000 portions of Scotch Lamb to be served in schools for St Andrew's Day; understands that teachers will also receive three fresh lamb recipes for students to prepare, along with two lesson plans exploring the journey of Scotch Lamb from farm to fork, highlighting its nutritional benefits and role in a healthy diet, provided by QMS's health and education team; understands that, in collaboration with Sodexo and Campbell Brothers, Scotch Lamb will be served at the Scottish Parliament canteen for MSPs, staff and visitors to enjoy; further understands that they will also be able to learn about what it sees as lamb's significance to Scotland's economy; recognises that Scotch Lamb has UK GI status, and believes that it is internationally renowned for its superior quality, high animal welfare standards and sustainable credentials, being produced in a country with abundant grazing land and heavy rainfall.

\*<u>S6M-15470</u> Kevin Stewart: Congratulations to Shopmobility Aberdeen—That the Parliament congratulates Shopmobility Aberdeen on being awarded The King's Award for Voluntary Service; notes that Shopmobility Aberdeen, which has been operating since 1992, provides a range of services to remove social and physical barriers to equality of mobility, including volunteer companions, and wheelchair accessible cars, mobility scooters and wheelchairs, in order to increase confidence and broaden choices; understands that it also takes part in local authority planning to ensure that the needs of people with barriers to their mobility are respected, and seeks out those who are socially isolated to provide them with the support that they need to reintegrate with their communities; further understands that The King's Award for Voluntary Service was created in 2002 and is the highest award given to local voluntary groups in the UK, and are awarded for life; believes that the team at Shopmobility Aberdeen should be rightly proud of this recognition for over 30 years of service to the people of Aberdeen, and wishes them all the best for the next 30 years and more.

\*<u>S6M-15469</u> Paul Sweeney: Recognising the Closure of the World's Oldest Family-run Magic Shop—That the Parliament recognises that Glasgow's much-loved Tam Shepherd's Trick and Joke Shop has closed for the final time after 138 years of business; understands that it is the world's oldest family-run magic shop, operating on Queen Street since 1888, and wishes everyone involved in the shop all the best for the future of their now online business.

\*<u>S6M-15467</u> Michelle Thomson: In the Land, of the People Exhibition at Blackness Castle. —That the Parliament congratulates Historic Environment Scotland (HES) on the opening of its new exhibition at Blackness Castle in the Falkirk East constituency; understands that the exhibition, which runs on selected dates from 1 November 2024 to 2 March 2025, is focused upon the intrinsic role folklore plays in life in Scotland; recognises that, throughout this exhibition, HES has utilised images from its archives to explore how folklore is rooted within the country, through its landscape, its history and its people; notes that visitors will be taken on a journey via these images through landscapes, monuments and the communities of Scotland to explore the evolving force of folklore, how it has shaped the cultural heritage and continues to shape the country of today; congratulates Historic Environment Scotland on the launch of what it sees as this important exhibition, highlighting the critical role folklore plays in the country's heritage and future, and thanks HES for the important work it does, caring for sites of cultural importance to Scotland.

\*<u>S6M-15466</u> Michelle Thomson: Central Taekwondo Academy's Continued Success—That the Parliament celebrates the recent and continued success of Central Taekwondo Academy's young athletes; understands that the academy has had recent success with three of its young athletes being selected to represent Scotland at various worldwide events; recognises that Max

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Cartwright has returned from Korea, where he represented team GB at the Junior World Championships in the under 73Kg category; notes that two athletes from the academy have been selected to compete at the upcoming World Poomsae Championships in Hong Kong, which will be held from 30 November to 4 December 2024, with Natasha Wilson being selected for the under 30 female category and Peter Sellwood selected in the junior male category; understands that the academy's founder and main instructor, grand master David Bailey, will be travelling to Hong Kong as a team GB coach; congratulates Central Taekwondo Academy and its athletes on their success, and wishes them all the best for upcoming championship.

\*<u>S6M-15465</u> Michelle Thomson: Falkirk Council Reduces Poverty Attainment Gap — That the Parliament recognises what it sees as the improvements throughout the Falkirk district, which have reportedly delivered a reduction in the poverty related attainment gap; understands that the poverty related attainment gap refers to children from poorer households obtaining lower results than their peers from wealthier families; notes reports that in 2021-22 this attainment gap in Falkirk was measured at 27.15%, while figures for the following year, 2022-23, show a decrease to 17.79%; further notes reports that, while official figures for 2024 will not be available until March 2025, it is expected that there will be a further reduction in this gap; celebrates what it sees as the successful utilisation of the Scottish Government's Shared Equity Fund, which, it believes, has been used to improve outcomes and focus upon literacy, particularly within schools where there are higher levels of depravation; understands that Falkirk Council now plans to extend this support over the next year to include numeracy outcomes within schools that support a higher concentration of pupils from deprived areas, and believes that, while the attainment gap requires further work to improve equitable outcomes for all of Falkirk's pupils, this reduction in the poverty related attainment gap must be celebrated as a positive step forward for all.

\*<u>S6M-15464</u> Neil Bibby: Paisley Radio Station Wins Five Prestige Scotland Awards—That the Parliament congratulates Paisley Radio on winning five Prestige Scotland Awards in November 2024; recognises that some of the awards that the organisation won were Prestige Scotland Radio Station of the Year, Radio Show Of the Year, for station manager Chris Lawler and his *Finally Friday* show, and Radio Personality of the Year for CEO Paul Wycherley; notes that Paul and Chris created Paisley Radio in March 2020, a week before the country went into lockdown due to the COVID-19 pandemic, and have built the station, from being produced in a living room, into a great success with around six million listeners from 180 countries; understands that the radio station is based in the centre of Paisley, and further understands that the organisation prides itself on giving young enthusiasts, who are interested in a career in the sector, an opportunity to learn from experienced staff, which includes 30 presenters that are based all over the world.

#### Proposals for Member's Bills

A member seeking to introduce a Member's Bill must first lodge a draft proposal, together with a consultation document (or a statement of reasons why consultation is not considered necessary). Subsequently, the member may lodge a final proposal, in broadly similar terms to the draft, accompanied by a summary of consultation responses (or the statement of reasons). The member secures the right to introduce a Bill to give effect to the proposal if the final proposal secures, within one month, the support of at least 18 other members from at least half the political parties or groups represented in the Parliamentary Bureau, and provided no statement is made that the Scottish Government is planning equivalent legislation.
