S6M-14683 Paul O'Kane: Challenge Poverty Week 2024—That the Parliament recognises Challenge Poverty Week 2024, which is coordinated by the Poverty Alliance, Scotland's antipoverty network, and runs from 7 to 13 October; notes that activities, events and actions will take place across Scotland, including in the West Scotland region, which will be aimed at increasing public support for tackling poverty and highlighting the realities of, and solutions to, poverty; acknowledges that Challenge Poverty Week 2023 was the biggest yet, with over 500 organisations taking part; notes that the week emphasises the need for fair funding for the third sector and the importance of a number of key policy asks, including across housing, transport, adequate incomes and food, to help unlock people from the grip of poverty; understands that 21% of people, and 24% of children, are living in the grip of poverty; notes the view that governments, elected members, civil society and communities all have a role to play in solving poverty; is concerned that particular groups of people, including women, lone parents, disabled people and people from black and minority ethnic backgrounds, are disproportionately experiencing poverty; considers that people in Scotland believe in compassion, justice and ending poverty; celebrates the work undertaken by organisations and communities across Scotland to stem what it sees as the rising tide of poverty, and notes the calls for MSPs to attend and support events and activities in their constituencies and regions as part of what it believes is this important campaign.

Members' Business motions that have not achieved cross party support

*S6M-14848 Fulton MacGregor: Publication of National Primary School Swimming Framework—That the Parliament welcomes the publication of the National Primary School Swimming Framework and supporting guidance for increasing and improving swimming lessons by primary schools, including in the Coatbridge and Chryston constituency; understands that the development of this framework has been carried out by Scottish Swimming, in partnership with Scottish Water, to improve the current levels of swimming attainment within Scottish schools as part of a wider effort to ensure that every primary school pupil is afforded the opportunity to learn how to swim; further understands that the main objectives of the framework's proposals include introducing non-swimmers to the aquatic environment to develop their water confidence, and developing a strict understanding of safety in the water; acknowledges that Scottish Swimming recommends pupils to have a minimum of seven and a half hours of curriculum swimming delivery, which could be comprised of 10 sessions of approximately 45 minutes; recognises that Scottish Swimming believes that the recommended age at which pupils should receive school swimming lessons is P4 and P5 because such children will have attained the appropriate literacy skills and before any social stigma can hinder their participation, which will help to ensure that all children have equal means and opportunities to engage with the swimming lessons; considers that the framework makes a clear distinction between a "universal" and "targeted" approach to school swimming provision, whereby all children are afforded the opportunity to swim, while a targeted approach identifies any pupils who are non-swimmers and require additional training and support; notes that the framework actively encourages swimming lessons in consistent blocks to support pupils in an organised way and ensuring that pupils are actively supported in teaching them how to swim; supports the framework's objectives on inclusivity, which highlight the provision of opportunities and pathways for children with physical, sensory, and learning impairments; praises the framework's objectives on the importance of reporting information to further understand the progress made by pupils, which will include information such as year group, school postcode, and any disabilities or health problems that are faced by pupils; believes that the framework has effectively emphasised aquatic safety at the heart of its recommendations on teaching children how to swim, and notes the belief that the framework provides an effective starting point for a national conversation on how to more effectively encourage swimming from a young age to be considered a vital skill to teach children.

*S6M-14861 Alexander Burnett: Young Engineers Club at Grampian Transport Museum Qualifies Two Racing Cars for the Greenpower International Finals—That the Parliament congratulates the Young Engineers Club at Grampian Transport Museum on the remarkable achievement of having two of its self-built and engineered F24 electric-powered racing cars, *Merlin*, crewed by Alexander Brodie and Harvey and Millie Pole, and *Bullet*, crewed by Charlotte Brown and Andrew and William McHardy, qualify for the prestigious Greenpower International Finals at Goodwood Racing Circuit on 13 October 2024; acknowledges the outstanding success of these cars, which secured their places in the final after competing in rigorous rounds at East Fortune and Alford; notes that only 70 cars from across the UK qualify for the final, making this an exceptional accomplishment for the team; recognises the remarkable performance of *Merlin*, which broke the record for the most laps travelled within the allotted 90-minute race time at both events in June 2024, achieving 128 laps in each race while demonstrating impressive teamwork

*S6M-14860 Fulton MacGregor: Baby Loss Awareness Week 2024—That the Parliament recognises Baby Loss Awareness Week, which takes place from 9 to 15 October 2024; understands that what originally began as National Baby Loss Awareness Day in 2002, Baby Loss Awareness Week has taken place every October in the UK since then; notes that like in previous years, the week ends with the Wave of Light on 15 October, a moment for families and loved ones to light candles to remember their much-loved babies; understands that for some, this is a private moment of reflection, while others will share photos or videos of their candles on social media to connect with others taking part; recognises the work that Baby Loss Awareness Week does in offering support to grieving parents, while breaking what it sees as the stigma of talking about miscarriage and baby loss; notes that many buildings and landmarks across the UK will turn their lights pink and blue to raise awareness of the week; acknowledges the excellent work done by the Coatbridge-based charity, Baby Loss Retreat, which was founded in February 2018 by Julie and Bryan Morrison; praises the charity for its hard working and continued efforts to support parents and families who have been affected by miscarriage, stillbirth and neonatal death; commends the work done by so many to ensure easy access to the baby loss Memorial Book, which, it understands, was introduced in 2023 to ensure that those who have experienced a pregnancy or baby loss can remember their child, and extends its sincere condolences to all those who have been affected by miscarriage, stillbirth and neonatal death.

*S6M-14859 Bill Kidd: Ratification of the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons — That the Parliament welcomes the reported ratification of the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons (TPNW) by a further three UN member states, namely Indonesia. Sierra Leone and Solomon Islands; understands that this brings the total number of signatories to 94, with 73 of these nations having fully ratified the treaty and incorporated it into their national legislation; considers that Indonesia's ratification of the treaty is significant, in light of its position as the largest country by population to have ratified the TPNW, having consistently been involved in keeping Southeast Asia a nuclear weapons-free zone, and due to being a member of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN); understands that, despite a majority of respondents believing that the UK should ratify the TPNW and three quarters believing that the UK should participate in TPNW meetings, as indicated by a poll conducted by Survation on behalf of the Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament, the UK has neither signed nor ratified the TPNW and has consistently voted against an annual UN General Assembly resolution that would lead to the adoption of the TPNW; hopes that what it sees as this increased global participation with and support for the TPNW will lead to the UK reconsidering its opposition to the adoption of the TPNW, and encourages it to attend the third meeting of the TPNW in March 2025 as an observer state.

*S6M-14854 Sandesh Gulhane: New Dyslexia Report Published on Dyslexia Awareness Week—That the Parliament recognises that 30 September to 6 October 2024 marked Dyslexia Awareness Week Scotland; understands that it is estimated that one in 10 people in the UK are dyslexic; further understands that dyslexia is a learning difficulty, ranging from mild to severe, which primarily affects reading and writing skills but also the ability to process and remember information; praises the work of Dyslexia Scotland, the country's national charity, which aims to create a dyslexia-friendly Scotland that values the skills and talents of dyslexic people; recognises that, as well as raising awareness, the charity offers a range of services such as a free helpline, events across the country, resources for teachers and delivery of training; commends, in particular, the charity's recently published report, in partnership with the University of Glasgow,
