# **Motions for Debate**

\*S6M-00144 Humza Yousaf: Health Recovery—That the Parliament welcomes the Scottish Government commitment to produce an NHS Recovery plan within 100 days, reflecting that the necessary actions of the NHS to deal with the COVID-19 pandemic have impacted on waiting times for care and treatment; recognises that this impact will mean that many people are waiting longer for treatment and that this will be a source of worry for them and their families: notes that the aim of the recovery plan will be to increase inpatient, day case and outpatient activity by 10%, and that urgent care such as cancer will continue to be prioritised and action taken to reduce the longest waits; believes that the recovery plan should address both mental and physical health as all aspects of wellbeing have been affected by the pandemic; further believes that a women's health plan should also be brought forward within 100 days in order to better shape the services that are needed by women of all ages but that have too often fallen short in the past; commends the health and care staff for the remarkable efforts that they have made to provide the best care and treatment possible during the pandemic, and recognises that fundamental to the recovery of the NHS is a recognition of their care and support needs so that they can best meet the needs of patients, and supports the establishment of a National Care Service to ensure that care services are founded on fairness, equality and human rights, and are placed on the same level of esteem as the National Health Service.

### Members' Business motions that have not achieved cross party support

\*<u>S6M-00138</u> Monica Lennon: Historical Forced Adoption—That the Parliament condemns the historical practice of forced adoption, where up to 250,000 mothers were unfairly coerced, resulting in their new-born babies being taken away from unmarried mothers; notes that, in the UK, it is estimated 60,000 of the women resided in Scotland; acknowledges that the babies were taken away against their mother's will and placed for adoption; understands that lawyers examining the birth mothers' cases have focused on the period between 1945 and 1975, before a change in the UK adoption law, when around 500,000 babies were adopted, mostly from mothers who were under 24, denying them the right to care for their children; notes the view that the UK and Scottish governments should follow the lead of the Australian Government in 2013, by taking

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responsibility for the policies and practices that forced the separation of mothers from their babies, and further notes calls for the Scottish Government to initiate an inquiry regarding the practice in Scotland, acknowledge to the public through a formal apology that there had been wrongdoings and ensure that support is available to women and families in Central Scotland and across the country who have had to live with the consequences of the actions of government in the past.

\*<u>S6M-00131</u> Rachael Hamilton: Success of Great Borders River Clean—That the Parliament recognises the success of the Great Borders River Clean, which returned on 15-16 May 2021; congratulates the 460 volunteers who took part and collected over 3,000kg of rubbish from the River Tweed, including shopping trolleys, mattresses, signposts and a sun dial; thanks GreenTweed Eco for organising the event; recognises the strength and spirit of Borders' towns and communities, who pulled together to tackle a common cause, and notes the importance of volunteer work ahead of Volunteers' Week 2021, which takes place from 1 to 7 June.

\*<u>S6M-00127</u> Karen Adam: Maternity Services at Dr Gray's Hospital in Moray—That the Parliament welcomes the decision by the Scottish Government to commission an independent review of maternity services at Dr Gray's Hospital in Elgin to consider how best to restore a consultant-led service; understands that the decision by NHS Grampian to temporarily downgrade maternity services in Moray has caused serious concerns for women and families across the area; notes that women with medium- and high-risk pregnancies continue to face a round-trip of up to 160 miles to Aberdeen Royal Infirmary to deliver their babies; commends the Keep MUM group for its campaign to have the consultant-led service restored; praises the frontline staff at Dr Gray's Hospital for the high level of care they provide to women and families in Moray, and notes the calls on NHS Grampian to continue to work with Keep Mum, the community and the Scottish Government to secure the long-term future of the consultant-led service at Dr Gray's Hospital so that women and babies in Moray can access the care they need locally and also to ensure that the area remains an attractive destination for families to live and work.

\*S6M-00143 Craig Hoy: Welcoming the Phased Reopening of the Bridge Centre in

**Haddington**—That the Parliament welcomes the phased reopening of the Bridge Centre in Haddington; notes that the centre, operated by the Lamp of Lothian Trust, is used by over 40 organisations including the Lammermuir Larder, The Motorcycle Project and mother and toddler groups; further notes and welcomes that the trust has made the centre's courtyard available to the neighbouring Tyneside Tavern, allowing a local business to maintain trade during COVID-19 restrictions, and thanks the Friends of the Lamp and Trusts for their combined efforts to support the centre and the local groups and individuals in Haddington and East Lothian which use it.

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number of people affected by them, unfair evictions and income insecurity existed pre-pandemic; believes that many of these issues will persist post-recovery, and encourages the Scottish Government to look at whether any aspects of the COVID-19 legislation, which was brought in to support people experiencing hard times can be amended and taken forward to better protect people from homelessness and debt permanently.

\*<u>S6M-00139</u> Foysol Choudhury: Professor Sir Geoff Palmer OBE CD appointed the new Chancellor of Heriot-Watt University—That the Parliament congratulates Professor Sir Geoff Palmer OBE CD on becoming the new Chancellor of Heriot-Watt University; notes that he is of the Windrush generation and came to Scotland in 1964 to study and later to work, gaining his PhD and DSc degree from the University of Edinburgh and Heriot-Watt University respectively; recognises that he is a renowned research scientist who invented the revolutionary barley abrasion process, promoted Scottish grain in China, and has taught many successful brewers and distillers; further notes that, as well as holding a number of honorary degrees, he was Scotland's first black professor and was the first European resident to be honoured with the American Society of Brewing Chemists' Award of Distinction, considered to be the "Noble prize" in the world of brewing, and acknowledges that, in addition to being well known for his community, human rights and history work, including his appointment as the first ambassador for the Robert Burns World Federation, he has served as a board member and Chair of many organisations, was recently made a Commander of Distinction by the Government of Jamaica and is the first Honorary Consul for Jamaica in Scotland.

\*S6M-00137 Sue Webber: Forth Ports Unveils Ambitious Investment Plans for the Port of

Leith—That the Parliament welcomes the news that Forth Ports has unveiled ambitious proposals for the creation of Scotland's largest renewable energy hub at the Port of Leith; understands that this £40 million private investment will support Scotland's economic recovery and energy transition plans; acknowledges that it will support the regeneration of the Port and create numerous jobs in the area, reinforcing what it sees as the position of the Central Belt as a leading area of engineering and manufacturing skills and capabilities, and wishes all involved with this project success.

<u>S6W-00222</u> Pauline McNeill: To ask the Scottish Government what support it will offer to Scotland-based musicians to cover any additional costs of touring that they might face because of Brexit.

<u>S6W-00223</u> Pauline McNeill: To ask the Scottish Government what discussions it has had with the UK Government regarding the format of funding that might be provided to support any extra costs of touring that Scotland-based musicians might face because of Brexit.

<u>S6W-00236</u> Graham Simpson: To ask the Scottish Government how many delays to ferry services operated by CalMac have been caused by mechanical complications in the last five years.

<u>S6W-00249</u> Paul Sweeney: To ask the Scottish Government whether it will revise its vaccination policy to ensure that, regardless of their home address, all school staff within the Glasgow City Council area are prioritised for vaccination within the next month.

<u>S6W-00250</u> Alex Cole-Hamilton: To ask the Scottish Government what (a) guidance and (b) training is currently provided to teachers and learning support staff on recognising the signs of eating disorders in young people.

<u>S6W-00251</u> Alex Cole-Hamilton: To ask the Scottish Government how much of the budget for mental health services for 2021-22 will be allocated to the treatment of eating disorders.

<u>S6W-00263</u> Paul Sweeney: To ask the Scottish Government whether it will introduce drop-in vaccination clinics in the Glasgow City Council area.

<u>S6W-00268</u> Daniel Johnson: To ask the Scottish Government what action it is taking to ensure that historical links to slavery are properly displayed on statues of slave owners or slavery profiteers around Edinburgh and Scotland, and whether it plans to take further action to acknowledge and highlight Scotland's role in the slave trade, to ensure that it is part of the national conversation.

The last lodging day for amendments at Stage 2 is four sitting days before the meeting at which those amendments will be considered (e.g. Wednesday for a meeting on Tuesday); at Stage 3 it is five days before. Amendments may be lodged until 4.30 pm on any sitting day, except on the last lodging day for each Stage, when the deadline is 12 noon.

A Hybrid Bill is subject to the same rules except in the case of Stage 2 where amendments for consideration may be lodged no earlier than the completion of any consideration of evidence at Stage 2.

Amendments to Private Bills are subject to different deadlines. These are set out in Rule 9A.12 of Standing Orders.

Members are advised to lodge amendments in good time before the beginning of a Stage and as early as possible during the day.

# European Charter of Local Self-Government (Incorporation) (Scotland) Bill (M)

Passed, 23 March 2021 The Bill has been referred to the Supreme Court under section 33 of the Scotland Act 1998 by the Attorney General and the Advocate General for Scotland.

# UK Withdrawal from the European Union (Legal Continuity) (Scotland) Bill (G)

Passed, 21 March 2018 Following a reference under section 33 of the Scotland Act 1998 by the Attorney General and the Advocate General for Scotland, the Supreme Court has ruled that some provisions of the Bill are outwith the legislative competence of the Scottish Parliament. The Bill cannot be submitted for Royal Assent in its unamended form.

### United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (Incorporation) (Scotland) Bill (G) Passed, 16 March 2021

The Bill has been referred to the Supreme Court under section 33 of the Scotland Act 1998 by the Attorney General and the Advocate General for Scotland.
