Members' Business motions that have not achieved cross party support

*S6M-04082 Sharon Dowey: Marking the 40th Anniversary of the Liberation of the Falkland Islands—That the Parliament marks the 40th anniversary of the liberation of the Falkland Islands in 1982; notes that the anniversary is recognised as a national holiday in the Falklands; recognises all the brave sacrifices made by the British military personnel, their families and the British public throughout this 74-day war; celebrates what it sees as the unity demonstrated by UK citizens in a time of great need to restore freedom for the people in the Falklands; highlights what it considers are the strong cultural links between Scotland and the Falkland community and recognises the significant contribution that members of the Armed Forces from Scotland made to liberating the Islands in 1982; commemorates the lives of the three civilian Falkland Islanders and 255 British military personnel that were sadly lost, as well as the hundreds that were injured; notes the significant role that many civilians reportedly played in supporting the Task Force on its campaign in the South Atlantic; further notes the support that it believes the UK Government continues to provide to the Falklands' right to self-determination and their wish to remain a UK Overseas Territory; expresses its support for veterans on both sides and Islanders who it understands still struggle with mental and physical scars as a consequence of the events that they have experienced or witnessed; acknowledges the year-long programme of different honouring and celebratory events across the world that aim to commemorate the sacrifices made in 1982; values the Falkland Islands as what it considers a forward-looking community with a strong sense of culture and heritage, and celebrates what it sees as the great progress made in the Falkland Islands since 1982.

*S6M-04057 Katy Clark: DWP Office Closures—That the Parliament notes with concern the UK Government's reported announcement that the Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) plans to close 41 offices across the UK by June 2023; understands that 13 of these closures, which would affect 64 workers at Aberdeen and over 100 at Kirkcaldy, are processing sites where no alternative nearby premises have been identified for relocation of staff; further understands that a further six sites in Scotland will close with an alternative site for relocation offered, including in the West Scotland region; notes with concern the estimates reported by the PCS trade union that the closure and relocation of these offices will put up to 3,000 workers at risk of redundancy in total; further notes the publication of figures by the DWP, which it understands indicate that jobs in Scotland have already been cut by a third since 2011, meaning that Scotland has experienced the

fastest rate of DWP job cuts in the country; acknowledges what it sees as the tireless work of civil servants at the DWP, who it understands have paid out benefits to almost 2.5 million families during the COVID-19 pandemic and been described as "miracle workers" by the Prime Minister; notes the view that these latest cuts are part of a wider agenda to unjustly place more responsibility on individual claimants, who it understands already face sanctions if they refuse to take up a job offer if it involves less than a 90-minute commute; further notes the view that the UK Government should reverse these cuts, which it considers undermine the UK Government's levelling up agenda and will have a negative impact on workers, claimants and wider communities, and notes the calls for UK and Scottish government ministers to work with Social Security Scotland and the DWP to save jobs and develop contingency measures for redeployment of staff who face redundancy if these cuts are pursued.

Other new and altered motions and amendments

*S6M-04092 Sharon Dowey: Successful Girvan Clothing Company Takes On America—That the Parliament congratulates Girvan's Michael Sandilands on the clothing company that he launched in lockdown aiming to enter the American market; notes that, with the help of Michael's three young daughters, his clothing company, OffxSpringz, has taken off during the last 12 months; further notes that the clothing brand was intended to be a fun activity for the children during lockdown, with Michael and the children creating their signature teddy bear design; understands that the company now sells a range of clothing items, including t-shirts and hats, with orders packed in a log cabin that Michael built in his back garden; notes that, once Michael surpassed 4,000 orders, he was able to take on an employee to deal with the demand; acknowledges that this new venture to America will allow the company to expand, and the brand to grow overseas, and wishes Michael and his children well as they continue to develop their successful clothing brand.

*S6M-04091 Annabelle Ewing: Let's Talk Crossgates—That the Parliament congratulates the Crossgates and Mossgreen Community Council on launching its new magazine; understands that this is to be distributed to all households within the local area; notes that the first edition provides residents with information on the work of the community council and local community groups within the village; hopes that the small booklet will help residents become more involved with local groups, and wishes the community council all the best with its distribution of the magazine.

*S6M-04087 Gillian Mackay: Deaf Awareness Week 2022—That the Parliament celebrates Deaf Awareness Week, which runs from 2 to 8 May 2022 and is an annual event that aims to raise awareness and understanding of hearing loss and deafness; notes that, during the week, deaf charities and local groups across Scotland will celebrate exceptional deaf individuals, and showcase what can be done to champion inclusivity and make Scotland a more deaf-friendly country; understands that many deaf young people in Scotland, including those with moderate or mild hearing loss, have told the National Deaf Children's Society that they have faced particular challenges around communication and social isolation over the last two years, including due to the wearing of facemasks and use of remote learning during lockdown; further understands that recent research by the Society has found that deaf learners in Scotland are twice as likely to leave school with no qualifications, and only half as likely to go onto university, as hearing learners; believes that, with the right support in place, deaf young people can do anything and can achieve just as much as their hearing friends; welcomes the UK-wide petition launched by young members of the Young People's Advisory Board of the Society calling for every teacher to be given the skills and tools that they need to make sure that deaf students are included and able to achieve their full

potential; believes that all schools would benefit from taking steps to improve deaf awareness and understanding of how best to support deaf children in class, and encourages all MSPs to support the deaf community and deaf children, young people and their families across Scotland.

*S6M-04086 Evelyn Tweed: Stirling Distillery Success at London Spirits Competition—That the Parliament congratulates Stirling Distillery on winning silver and bronze medals at the 5th London Spirits Competition, which took place in London from 23 to 25 March 2022; understands that the distillery won silver medals for its Stirling Classic Gin and raspberry flavoured Red Cap Liqueur, and a bronze medal for its Green Lady Liqueur; notes that the drinks were scored highly across the three judging criteria of quality, value and packaging, and further notes that the London Spirits Competition is organised by the Beverage Trade Network and takes place annually in London.

*S6M-04085 Monica Lennon: Faces and Voices of Recovery UK Addiction Advocacy Service Report—That the Parliament commends the work of the advocacy charity, Faces and Voices of Recovery UK (FAVOR UK), in supporting individuals affected by substance misuse; understands that, in March 2021, FAVOR UK received funding from the Corra Foundation to deliver an advocacy service, predominately based in Scotland's Central Belt, and has recently published a six-month progress report; notes that, according to the report, demand for this service has exceeded expectations, highlighting what it sees as the high demand for drug and alcohol addiction advocacy services; is concerned that some individuals who interacted with the advocacy service reportedly had low awareness of other local services, experienced restricted choice of access to residential rehabilitation, and reported feeling disrespected or abandoned by services; commends the advocacy work led by FAVOR UK, and believes that the Scottish Government and partners should reflect on the findings of the report and take further action to improve access to addiction and recovery services across Scotland.

*S6M-04084 Sarah Boyack: Edinburgh Festival Fringe Reaches 75-year Milestone—That the Parliament congratulates the Edinburgh Festival Fringe on its 75th anniversary; notes that it began in 1947 with eight companies taking a risk, turning up uninvited and performing on the "fringe" of the Edinburgh International Festival; acknowledges that there is now a global movement of more than 200 fringe festivals that all followed Edinburgh's blueprint; celebrates that it is now a charity established by artists to nurture other artists, and the values of inclusivity, experimentation and imagination; understands that it includes theatre, comedy, dance, circus, cabaret, opera music and spoken word; recognises the enormous impact of Edinburgh's festivals on the economy of Scotland and Edinburgh in particular; believes that the Fringe and other festivals play a large part in shaping the worldwide profile and culture of the city of Edinburgh; celebrates that the Edinburgh Festival Fringe has previously been voted top of the 500 must-do experiences in the UK by Lonely Planet; celebrates the creativity, energy and imagination of the artists, crew, staff, volunteers, organisers and audiences who come to Edinburgh each year, and wishes them all, in future Fringes and the anniversary celebrations, the best of luck.
