*<u>S6M-05949</u> Mark Ruskell: Greyhound Racing in Scotland—That the Parliament notes the reported proposed closure of the last licensed greyhound racing track in Scotland, Shawfield Stadium, Rutherglen; further notes the Scottish Animal Welfare Commission's view that there should be an end to greyhound racing at unlicensed tracks, including, it understands, the last remaining track at Thornton in Fife; acknowledges reported animal welfare concerns linked with greyhound racing, including neglect, malnutrition, doping with Class A substances, lack of adequate healthcare provision, and severe and fatal injuries; highlights the latest reported data released by the Greyhound Board of Great Britain (GBGB) regarding Shawfield Stadium, reporting 197 injuries and 15 deaths between 2017 and 2020; understands that there is no similar data at unlicenced tracks where there is no official regulatory body present to ensure that animal welfare standards are met, and commends campaigners and rescue organisations for their ongoing rehoming and awareness-raising work, including the Scottish SPCA, One Kind, League Against Cruel Sports Scotland, Scotland Against Greyhound Exploitation, and others.

to reduce alcohol and drug-related deaths in the community, with, it understands, the number of drugs deaths reducing from 33 to 16 last year; considers that this figure still represents 16 lives lost, with the lives of families and friends being devastated, and notes the view that efforts to prevent drugs deaths must continue at pace so that the number of people who succumb to addiction continues to fall; grieves the loss of all those who have lost their lives through addiction, and notes the view that Parliament should do all it can to prevent drug and alcohol related deaths and to help ensure people have access to the right treatment at the right time. **R**

*S6M-05974 Alexander Stewart: University of Stirling Develops Dementia-friendly Guidance **Tool**—That the Parliament welcomes the news that experts from the University of Stirling have created a tool to help make homes, premises and public places more dementia friendly; understands that the Environments for Ageing and Dementia Design Assessment Tool (EADDAT) combines the latest research on designing for cognitive change with the expertise of leading architects based at the university's Dementia Services Development Centre (DSDC); believes that EADDAT is available to those seeking to make homes, restaurants, cafes and public buildings more accessible; considers that the tool could be useful for communities who have been placing an emphasis on dementia-friendly places, such as the development trusts at Dollar and Clackmannan; notes that according to Lesley Palmer, chief architect at Stirling University's DSDC, around two thirds of people with dementia in the UK live at home within their communities, and it is a requirement that supermarkets, pharmacies, and other public places make reasonable adjustments to enable everyone to use their facilities; understands that research demonstrates that dementia design can sustain independence and support quality of life for people with dementia, in addition to age-friendly environments which can help foster healthy and active ageing by building and maintaining cognitive capacities across the course of people's lives; considers that this is of increasing importance, given that the global population is ageing; acknowledges that this ground-breaking new tool is designed to be more accessible and covers an array of building types. and commends the work of Lesley and all her teams in the University of Stirling's Dementia Services Development Centre on their highly innovative work.

A member seeking to introduce a Member's Bill must first lodge a draft proposal, together with a consultation document (or a statement of reasons why consultation is not considered necessary). Subsequently, the member may lodge a final proposal, in broadly similar terms to the draft, accompanied by a summary of consultation responses (or the statement of reasons). The member secures the right to introduce a Bill to give effect to the proposal if the final proposal secures, within one month, the support of at least 18 other members from at least half the political parties or groups represented in the Parliamentary Bureau, and provided no statement is made that the Scottish Government is planning equivalent legislation.
